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
Recent Developments

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MODEL UN FIELD TRIP

March 14-15, 2022

"47" students attended the international GCMUN Conference where they got to step into leadership positions and debate topics such as gender equality, conflict resolution, and cyber security. Students also had the opportunity to meet Martin Luther King III and attend his keynote address.





GUEST SPEAKER

March 17, 2022

To culminate Global History students' study of Unresolved Global Conflict (1914-1945) grandchildren of Holocaust survivers came to "47" to act as a living link and speak of their grandparents' experiences during the Holocaust. Students had the opportunity to root their understanding of history in the stories of others, and further their understanding by asking the speakers questions.



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DEAFLYMPICS ATHLETE INTERVIEW

May 9, 2022

Two players from the women's USA Deaf basketball team took time from their busy schedules in Brazil during the Deaflympics to interview with some of our ASL students. The students practiced their questions beforehand and asked them in ASL during the interview. A few days later, the USA women's basketball team won gold!

Although it is 2022, these games were supposed to be played in the summer of 2021, so it is still listed as the 2021 Deaflympics. There were 71 countries from around the world competing in these games, with a total of 2,349 athletes! The games officially began with an Opening Ceremony on May 1st and officially ended with a Closing Ceremony on May 15th. The summer games have a lengthy list of sports! Individual sports included: Athletics (Track & Field), Badminton, Cycling (Mountain Biking & Road), Golf, Judo, Karate, Orienteering, Shooting, Swimming, Table Tennis, Taekwondo, Tennis, and Wrestling (Freestyle, and Greco-Roman). Team sports included: Basketball, Football (Soccer), Handball, Volleyball (Indoor & Beach), and Bowling. USA won a total of 55 medals: 20 gold, 11 silver, and 24 bronze! 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Study Tips

Adapted from "Top 10 Study Tips for High School Students Preparing for College" by Kate Barrington, Public School Review

1. Create a study schedule.

Set aside time every day to devote to your studies so you can get your work done and still have time for enjoyment. It's always better to study a little each day than to cram in the last few hours before a test.

2. Seek help when you don't understand something.

Your teachers and other students are a resource you should take advantage of to make sure you understand the material completely.

3. Try a study group.

In some cases, study groups can actually detract from your studies if you spend more time socializing than studying, but they are a wonderful resource when used properly. Find a group of students in the same classes as you and suggest a study group. When it comes to assignments, you can divide and conquer or you can work through them together.

4. Make flashcards.

If you have a lot of material to remember—especially if it's small facts like names or dates—flashcards are a wonderful study tool. The act of writing everything out is valuable in and of itself, but the flashcards will also help you to solidify your understanding of the material.

5. Change it up from time to time.

Rather than spending four hours studying for a single class, try dividing up your academic workload and alternate between subjects. If you change things up from time to time, you'll be less bored, which means you'll focus more on the material and retain more of it in the long run.

6. Use your notes wisely.

Don't just take notes and forget about them – review them several times to really solidify your understanding and memory of the material!

7. Highlight and rewrite your notes.

In addition to reviewing your notes after taking them, you may also want to highlight them as you review. Highlight important concepts and facts so you can easily focus on those areas when you go back through to study. You may even find that rewriting your notes is helpful for remembering the material!

8. Get enough sleep!

This may not seem like a study tip, but a great deal of research shows that getting a good night's rest is imperative for strong academic performance. If you follow the study tips above, you'll get your work done with plenty of time to get a full night of sleep. In the morning you'll be more alert and focused and ready for class.




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COMPUTER SCIENCE HACKATHON
