Recent Developments

MOMA FIELD TRIP

October 12, 2022

Students visited the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) on October 12, thoroughly exploring the five floors of modern and contemporary artwork. They were greeted upon entrance to Barbara Kruger's challenging exhibition, "Thinking of You. I Mean Me. I Mean You." Students have been focusing a good amount on visual literacy throughout the first month of art classes, and Kruger's work was a great opportunity to experience an artist who mixes visual methodology with hard literature. Another highlight was the photographer Wolfgang Tillman's retrospective/exhibition, "To Look Without Fear." Tillmans' work boldly captures modern reality, in all its strange and dynamic ways. Students really connected with the hyperrealism that the artist's photographs exude, as the artist is often thought of as a progenitor of the Instagram age. MoMA is filled to the brim with inspirational and historical artwork, and this was an amazing opportunity for students to experience this work in person.

BROOKLYN MUSEUM FIELD TRIP

October 28, 2022

Students visited the Brooklyn Museum on Friday, October 28, taking in a wide variety of dynamic exhibitions and artwork. They experienced the radical folk art of Nellie Mae Rowe, viewing the many drawings, paintings and sculptures the artist created throughout her lifetime. They walked around, studied, and made sketches of a sculptural simulation of Mae's lifetime house, reflecting on the intensity the artist lived with in all aspects of her life. Other highlights of the museum included Oscar yi Hou's exhibit, "East of Sun, West of Moon," a collection of the artist's bold and dizzying paintings, and "Climate in Crisis: Environmental Change in the Indigenous Americas," where students pondered the meaning and symbolism of the socially-charged work. It was another memorable trip for art students at 47 ASL, as they got to experience artwork with each other, teachers and museum guides.

NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

November 2022

Native Americans have been living on the American continent since about 12,000 B.C. They were not a single nation but a rich variety of cultures, peoples, and languages. Some historians believe people have been living in South America for more than 30,000 years.

There are about 4.5 million people of Native American and Alaska Native heritage in the U.S. This group makes up about 1.5% of the U.S. population. 60% of the global food supply is based on crops that originated in North America. These crops include: pumpkin, squash, corn, blueberries, black raspberries, turkey, and maple syrup.

Fun fact: the Lenape, Manhattan's original inhabitants, called the island *Manahatta*, which means "hilly island."

PSAT & SAT CORNER

Welcome to the PSAT & SAT corner. This column will address some of the most frequently asked questions and concerns that students and parents have about these tests:

- When do I take the PSAT/SAT? At "47," students take the PSAT in the spring of their sophomore year, and take the SAT in the spring of their Junior year. Students who are unhappy with their scores can take the test again independently.
- Why is the PSAT & SAT important? Many colleges require students to submit their SAT score, and use it as a measure of college readiness. The PSAT provides an opportunity for students to experience what taking the SAT is like and also gives students opportunities for scholarships.
- **Is the PSAT and SAT hard?** While many students find the PSAT & SAT to be challenging, preparing and studying can go a long way to improving your score, making you feel confident when you sit down to test.
- How can you study for the PSAT/SAT? There are many ways and resources to help you study. You can sign up
 through the College-Board/Khan Academy, which offers daily practice with test questions like those on the PSAT &

At our last advisory, many students noted that the key to avoiding NYCDOE Discipline Code infractions was to "think before you act," but what does this really mean, and how can we accomplish this more thoughtfully?

This article is a resource for those asking this question. Though the article is designed for teachers, it could equally be read by students. It separates responses to situations into two categories:

T.H.I.N.K. before you Speak:

- Is it True?
- Is it Helpful?
- Is it Inspiring?
- Is it Necessary?
- Is it Kind?

P.A.U.S.E. before you Act:

- Does it have a Purpose?
- Is it Appropriate for the moment?
- Is it Understood by the individual?
- Does it contribute to your Success?
- Does it Echo your guiding principles?

Practice asking these questions to yourself a few times, and remembering the tip to T.H.I.N.K. before you Speak and P.A.U.S.E before you Act. Next time you make a decision about saying something or doing something to someone else, you will have a system for seeing if it is worthwhile for you.

Q3: If you could win an Olympic medal for any sport, real or fake, what would it be?


In an alternate universe, I'd win a gold medal for Olympic Dressage.
