ROSE GRAMS


Tuesday, February 14, 2023

Wednesday, February 15, 2023



BASKETBALL SEASON ENDS

The "47" boys basketball team finished up an amazing year on Thursday night, March 2, 2023, losing in the second round of the playoffs to a very talented squad from Fannie Lou Hamer. It was a tough loss after such an amazing year (16 wins, 4 loses, and an epic playoff victory over EBC/Bushwick Leaders), but there's nothing but respect and admiration for all the student athletes that gave everything they had to this team. This year's group played with a ton of heart and made quick work of most of the league with its dynamic team-playing and inspired leadership, led by its seniors: E-Lin Gross, Ethan Gross and Maxwell Gomez. E-Lin led the league in ppg (28.3) and had the second most total points of all high school basketball players in the all the boroughs this year, a mighty impressive feat. Both Gross brothers played dominant all year (Ethan averaged nearly a double-double (17 ppg, 8 rpg), and combined with Maxwell Gomez's slick style and veteran leadership, the three seniors were a vital component to the team's success. This school will miss these guys, both for their outstanding athletic prowess and
